Michael Lockwood - Bijou Cinema

It is with sadness that we report the death of Michael Lockwood, who set up the Bijou Cinema. Geoff Matthews of the Jazz Group has provided the following tribute

"I met Michael at a U3A monthly meeting when he booked for a Jazz Group gig. He explained he had been bequeathed a considerable and unexpected sum of money and was negotiating to buy the old run down and empty Latin Lounge with a view to setting up a community arts cinema.

He invited me to look round when he eventually got the keys. What a daunting job it looked but Michael had a clear plan and set about it with great enthusiasm. He and I agreed that it could also be a good venue for live music and he kept me posted on progress with occasional visits.

He had the usual planning tussles with the Council and problems with contractors which delayed the project. What a delight it was to see the Bijou Cinema open in 2019 and we agreed to organise a U3A Jazz Gig as soon as practicable. Michael had created a wonderful local social venue from his own resources which he then administered into not-for4-profit trust.

We organised the gig for the U3A for April 2020 which included a film show, live jazz and a meal provided by an outside caterer. It sold out pretty well immediately and we were 'gutted' to have to cancel it when Covid 19 struck and we agreed to rearrange as soon as possible.

I was shocked to hear of his death. He really was a philanthropist who worked hard for the community benefit and will be much mourned and missed. I hope the Bijou is able to continue despite his absence as it would be a great memorial to a really great bloke."

Being a "Maker"

Since retiring I decided to take up a new hobby. It took some time but I eventually decided to look into how technology would influence the future (4th Industrial Revolution) and learn to make things using the latest (but cheap) technology. I sometime combine them by building fun demonstrations that can be used during talks on future technology and at a local code club.

As the larger things I do are for educational use I try to incorporate all the STEAM educational categories (science, technology, engineering, art and mathematics) in a project. I try to make things fun so use Lego and Meccano in addition to computer components such as Raspberry Pis and Arduinos. As art is by far my weakest area, but one of the most enjoyable, I tend to focus on it and try to incorporate it into all projects. A few examples of projects include:

A camera made from a Box Brownie. Using a £4 computer and small computer camera. The photos were manipulated using "Google Deep Dream" artificial intelligence (very simple to use).

A Tide clock. A small display shows the time of day and tide levels for the day. Lots of different graphical features are included to show environmental readings. It uses a cheap Raspberry Pi.

Street Art. I took hundreds of photos of New Zealand Street Art and created an animated graphical rolling display. (I could do with someone with more artistic ability to take this further).

An environmental demonstration covering New Zealand earthquakes and

Zealand earthquakes and volcanic activity. It also includes a few smaller projects covering climate change and the impacts of CO2.

I've built 4 separate robots using different small computers.
Some projects use more than one.

"Having read the latest newsletter, I was interested to read the account by Colin Weir and how, as a child, his family tuned into Dick Barton.

Just out of interest and because this article reminded me, in 2003 (Duncan Carse, who was one of the voices of Dick Barton died in 2004) rang our house. My uncle was visiting at the time and Duncan Carse wanted to speak to him. He had a lovely deep voice, (ideal as a special agent).

Between 1951 and 1956 Duncan Carse led expedition surveys to the Antarctic and my uncle was the geologist who went with him (Alec Trendall). Alec later wrote a book in 2011 recording their surveys. Alec was invited to unveil a bronze bust of Duncan Carse at the Grytviken Museum in 2007."




Stories of the Night Sky
